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

# Edith Graham Mayo journal offers glimpse of NA history

When Darlene Bannon, CRNA, and Evadne Edwards, CRNA, were digging through boxes at the Olmsted County Historical Society, they made history of their own. They found a forgotten, 16-page journal written by Edith Graham Mayo, RN, the first nurse anesthetist at Mayo Clinic.

In 2004, Bannon and Edwards were both students in Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS) Master of Nurse Anesthesia Program. They were looking for materials for their research project on Graham Mayo, who was trained in anesthesia administration in 1889 by William Worrall Mayo, MD.

"The journal documented nursing, anesthesia, education and surgery for the first days of Saint Marys Hospital," says Bannon, who has worked at Mayo Clinic for 15 years. Edwards works in Washington D.C.

For example, the faded, handwritten booklet lists the supplies needed for anesthesia including air-tight tins for



cotton, absorbent gauze, the ether cone, hypodermic syringe and morphine, chloroform, brandy and alcohol.

"We found something that no one had written about," says Bannon. "We were ecstatic."

Over five years, Graham Mayo provided anesthesia for 650 procedures. And at a time when anesthesia mortality was a concern, 98.3 percent of Mayo Clinic's surgical patients survived.

Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA) becomes the official title to describe a nurse anesthetist who meets the standard requirements for AANA membership.


## 1924 John Lundy, MD


### More formalized education

n 2014, the first two groups of students started work on doctorate degrees in Nurse Anesthesia at Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS).

"It was a remarkable way to mark the 125th anniversary of nurse anesthesia at Mayo Clinic," says Mary Shirk Marienau, CRNA, PhD, director, Nurse Anesthesia Program.

About four years ago, Nurse Anesthesia Program leaders began work to convert the 30-month Master of Nurse Anesthesia (MNA) program to a 42-month Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice (DNAP) Entry-Into-Practice program. This change was initially mandated

by the nursing profession for all advanced-practice registered nurses (nurse anesthetists, nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists and nurse-midwives).

"It took a while to get our heads around what value we could add by moving to the doctorate degree," she says. "We have developed a curriculum that prepares our nurse anesthetists to better see the big picture of health care and patientcentered anesthesia delivery."

This doctorate program, designed for experienced nurses with bachelor's degrees, teaches all the skills required for a practicing nurse anesthetist including preanesthetic preparation, anesthesia induction and maintenance, and post-anesthetic care. At the same time, work was underway on a Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice Postgraduate Degree Program. This program is for certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNA) with master's degrees who want to broaden their skills in research, improve patient outcomes and incorporate evidence-based practice into care. Two students have started this track and have up to five years to complete their degrees.

Ten members of the core program faculty and staff, along with support from the Mayo Clinic Department of Anesthesiology, Mayo Clinic College of Medicine and MSHS worked on the transition from master's to doctorate degree. It culminated in accreditation in October 2013 by the Council on Accreditation of Nurse Anesthesia Educational Programs.

"Our program is one of the longer DNAP entry-into-practice programs in the country; we did not want to give up our strong clinical experience to accommodate the additional didactic and research demands of our doctorate degree," says Marienau. "Graduates will leave the program ready to fully provide outstanding anesthesia care in all settings."

career as a nurse anesthetist runs in the Ahle family.

The tradition started with John Ahle, who worked at Mayo Clinic as a nurse anesthetist for 28 years before retiring to work locum tenens. He now works at a Ladysmith, Wisconsin, hospital, close to his lake home.

The Ahles, from Rochester, are a Mayo Clinic family. John's mother, Elizabeth, was a registered nurse. His three sisters have had careers at Mayo Clinic. His older brother, Mike, started the Nurse Anesthesia (NA) Program at Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS). Mike later changed paths and worked in state government.

John, already working at Mayo as a high school student, was influenced by Mike. "I was an orderly and liked the environment and helping patients," John says. "Mike recommended the NA Program to me. I developed a plan, including how to pay for my education."

John served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1973 to 1975, knowing the GI Bill would help finance his

education. He earned an associate degree in nursing and was accepted at the MSHS NA Program.

John's younger brother, Mark, followed his brother's career path in nurse anesthesia. He graduated from the MSHS NA Program in 2005 and practices at Mayo Clinic.

Mark remembers a conversation with John that influenced his career change from construction, where he worked for a dozen years, to nursing. "We were on the way to northern Minnesota for a fishing trip. John's sons, Barrett and Sam, about 9 and 6, were asleep in the backseat," he says. "John talked about the challenges and rewards of being a nurse anesthetist. That was a pivotal moment in my decision to pursue this career."

John wonders if his sons were listening.

"It surprised me when each of my sons — and then my daughterin-law, Heidi — went into nursing," says John, whose wife, Cherrie, works at Mayo Clinic as a surgical nurse in outpatient surgery. "It really

surprised me when all three decided to pursue anesthesia."

Barrett and his wife, Heidi, are nurse anesthetists at Mayo Clinic. Sam is a student in the NA Program, and his wife, Cassy, an intensive care unit nurse at Mayo, is considering nurse anesthesia education.

Heidi (Nichols) Ahle, also grew up steeped in Mayo Clinic. Her mom was a cardiac nurse at Mayo and now works in outpatient orthopedics. In 1988, her dad was Mayo's first successful heart transplant recipient.

"I learned about anesthesia nursing from Barrett because of his dad," she says. "I can't imagine a better experience than the one we had at MSHS."

John agrees with his daughter-inlaw's assessment. "Mayo is a great place to train, and you gain a wealth of experience from complex cases," he says. "I'm proud of my family members and their accomplishments."

# Rotations deliver training to nurse-midwife students



he 40 to 60 babies delivered monthly by the Mayo Clinic midwife service are not only bundles of joy, they are learning opportunities for nurse-midwife students.

The Nurse-Midwifery Clinical Rotations Program provides the experience students need to become certified nurse-midwives (CNMs). CNMs are advanced-practice nurses who provide obstetrics and gynecology services for low-risk patients. And they are in big demand, much like nurse practitioners and advanced-practice nurses in other specialties.

More than 13,000 CNMs attended 313,000 births — representing 11.8 percent of vaginal births or 7.9 percent of total births — in the United States in 2012, according to the National Center for Health Statistics.

Although best known for providing care during labor and delivery, nurse-midwives are the nursing counterpart to obstetrics-

gynecology physicians, providing care for the entire continuum of women's health, including menopause.

"It's cost-effective care," explains DeAnna Griebenow, CNM, RN, director of the Nurse-Midwifery Program at Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS). When there are no risk factors, patients can opt to see an advanced-practice nurse for their care.

Students in the clinical rotation program must be a licensed Minnesota registered nurse enrolled in a master's or doctoral program. Under the supervision of CNMs, nurse practitioners and physicians in the outpatient clinic and the hospital's labor and delivery unit, students receive up to five months of training in:

- Prenatal care
- Labor and delivery
- Postpartum care
- Gynecologic care
- · Primary care

Griebenow became a CNM 14 years ago after attending the University of Minnesota Nurse-Midwifery Program and an informal Rochester. She was the third CNM at Mayo Clinic. Now there are 10.

"It used to be that a nurse-midwife student would contact a CNM and ask to follow her around for a couple of months," Griebenow recalls. "My experience motivated me to work with students. I took on the idea of clinical training being more formal. I approached MSHS and the Obstetrics and Gynecology Department, and they accepted the program in 2009."


The program accepts four students a year. "Students want to put the Mayo name on their resume, and there's a limited number of places that accept learners for clinical rotations," Griebenow says.

MSHS works with three nursemidwife programs:

- University of Minnesota School of Nursing, Minneapolis
- Frontier Nursing University, Hyden, Kentucky
- Georgetown University School of Nursing & Health Studies, Washington, D.C.

"We connect closely with those programs to know what their students are learning before they come to MSHS," Griebenow says.

Students who receive a certificate from MSHS and a master's degree or doctorate from an accredited nursemidwifery program are eligible to take the national certification exam.

### **Cortney White**

**Education**: Bachelor of Science in nursing from Loyola University, Chicago. Master's in nursing from Georgetown

University School of Nursing & Health Studies, Washington, D.C. Graduated in September 2014.

Career: A registered nurse for six years in the medical gastroenterology, colorectal surgery and neonatal intensive care units at Mayo Clinic in Rochester.

Motivation: "Even as a young girl, I always wanted to be a midwife and deliver babies. I went back to school because I knew I wanted to work with women, infants and their families."


About her Mayo rotation: "The whole rotation confirmed my desire to be a nurse-midwife. I felt myself blossom as a nurse-midwife student. I started out not confident and mostly observing. By the end, I was seeing patients on my own. I also delivered my first baby there, so it will always be special to me. I delivered 12 over two months. All 10 nurse-midwives at Mayo are amazing at what they do."

# A 40-year partnership to train operating room experts

hen graduates of the Surgical Technology Program at Rochester Community and Technical College (RCTC) walk into an operating room (OR) for their first day on the job, they are ready.

The RCTC Surgical Technology Program is a clinical affiliate of Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS), with much of the students' clinical work completed at Mayo Clinic Hospital – Rochester. The program and the collaboration marked a 40-year anniversary in 2014.

Michael Sarr, MD, a Mayo Clinic surgeon who served as a surgical liaison for the program for more than 10 years, has seen firsthand the value the graduates bring to Mayo Clinic. "I've found the people who come through this program to be fantastic," he says. Since 1974, the program has graduated about 1,000 students. In the last 10 years, 74 percent of graduates have been hired by Mayo Clinic.

"We rely on a technologist's expertise," says Dr. Sarr. Surgical

technologists prepare the operating room before a procedure, set up the surgical equipment and instruments, ensure a sterile environment, and pass instruments and supplies to the surgical team during an operation.

#### Filling an important need

The idea for the Surgical Technology Program originated with Beth Busho, then a nurse manager at Saint Marys Hospital, who wanted professionals specifically trained as technologists in surgery.

Students Cathy Gossman and Shayn McDonald work with Jane Kruger in a training laboratory. Kruger leads the Surgical Technology Program at Rochester Community and Technical College.

At Busho's urging, Rochester Area Vocational Technical Institute, as RCTC was then called, launched Surgical Technology as a nine-month diploma program. Originally, the students' clinical experience was at Saint Marys Hospital. In time, clinical rotations included Rochester Methodist Hospital as well as community hospitals throughout southeastern Minnesota.

In the mid-90s, based on a recommendation from the Association of Surgical Technologists, the program expanded from nine months to two years. Instead of a diploma, students now earn an associate of applied science degree.

"When our students graduate, they are ready to be on their own and function well on a wide range of surgical procedures," says Jane Kruger, who leads the Surgical Technology Program at RCTC.



#### Offering robust experience

There are more than 450 accredited surgical technology programs in the United States. What sets the RCTC program apart, according to Kruger, is the depth and breadth of clinical experience participants receive while they are still students.

"Our students benefit greatly by having the opportunity to be in operating rooms at Mayo Clinic," says Kruger. "They scrub on very complex procedures and see surgeries during their clinicals that it's unlikely they would have an opportunity to be involved in anywhere else."

Surgical technology students participate in 500 hours of clinical work. Paired with an experienced certified surgical technologist who mentors them, they spend time in all surgical specialties and rotate through outpatient surgery areas. They also have a four-week rotation at a smaller community hospital.

#### Creating reliable professionals

"By the time they are through with training, these students are fluid and confident in their ability to perform well in the OR under many circumstances, and they quickly become an integral part of the surgical team," says Sheri Zastrow, MSHS program director for the Surgical Technology Program and surgical services education supervisor.

Kruger says that career opportunities for graduates of the Surgical Technology Program are very good, especially for students who pass the National Board of Surgical Technology and Surgical Assisting certification exam to become certified surgical technologists.

"Many hospitals and health care organizations make it a condition of employment," says Kruger. Students are strongly encouraged to pursue certification.

Dr. Sarr, who has worked with dozens of program graduates, is pleased to work side by side with them. "They are consistently well-trained, dedicated and loyal members of our team who take their jobs very seriously."

Why surgical technology? I was a Navy medic first. When I got out of the service, I worked for a hospital in Virginia in a pathology lab. One of the people who worked in surgery told me about what surgical technologists do. It sounded interesting.

Why this program? I'm a Jersey boy. But I met my wife in the service, and she's from South Dakota. We wanted to move to the Midwest after our oldest was born. At the time, the Surgical Technology Program was offered through the technical college. The clinicals were at Saint Marys Hospital. I got in, we moved out here, and I've been here ever since.

Career so far? After graduation, I worked for three years at what is now the Federal Medical Center. At the time, it was the state hospital. They closed it in 1981, and Mary Brigh opened that same year. I started at Saint Marys in September of '81 and have worked here for 33 years. Right now, I work in ENT, ophthalmology, pediatrics, and oral and maxillofacial surgery.

Biggest changes you've seen? There have been many advances within the surgical arena over the years, especially in endoscopic procedures, including minimally invasive and robotic surgeries. The advances in technology are beyond anything I could have ever imagined at the beginning of my career. You have to stay abreast of what's happening. It's challenging, but I like that.

Why surgical technology? I wanted to be able to help people, and I felt that surgery would be an exciting field. My parents couldn't believe I was doing this because I didn't like the sight of blood. I explained to them that wasn't what it was all about. I've done it for 30 years now. It has been absolutely the right line of work.

Your work today? I'm a surgical first assistant at Olmsted Medical Center. I help the doctors position patients before surgery, and I help during the procedure. I also do closures for the doctors.

How did you get here? From 1984 to 1988, I worked at Saint Marys Hospital. Then I switched to Olmsted, and I've been a first assistant ever since. The years of experience at Saint Marys were wonderful preparation for this work.

**Training beyond graduation?** I do continuing education on a regular basis. I've always kept my certification over the years even though in my current role it is not required. I wouldn't want to be in a situation where the technology is unfamiliar. I love keeping up on the knowledge and changes in the field.

**Advice for new grads?** When you're new, the OR can be nerve-wracking. When I first started, there were times my nerves would get me shaking a little. But rely on your training and ask questions when you need to. Take time to develop your skills and confidence. Learn as much as you can from the people around you.



Why surgical technology? After several years in college working toward a nursing degree, I wasn't sure that was the right path. So I reconsidered what I really wanted to do. I talked to my sister, who is a certified surgical technologist. We discussed what she did in the operating room, and it sounded very interesting. I decided to give it a shot, and it has been great.

**Thoughts on the program?** RCTC's program is phenomenal. I was so well-prepared for the OR. My training made me an expert in the areas critical for surgical technologists. I know how to protect my instruments and maintain the sterile field at all times.

Your career path? When I was hired at Mayo, I was a temp in orthopedics at Saint Marys. From there, I was hired on full time. I went to general urology surgery. But as job postings came up, I moved around a bit. Currently, I'm at Mayo Clinic Hospital – Methodist Campus where I've worked in gynecologic surgery for 15 years. I'm also part of the in vitro fertilization team.

**Highlight of your work?** I enjoy being part of health care geared toward women. It's interesting being a woman myself, of course, but I have four daughters, too. That makes it even more important to me.

Why surgical technology? I had worked at Mayo for some time. I saw what surgical technologists do, and I decided I wanted to pursue that kind of work.

Why this program? Because being at Mayo already, I knew that the program was good. The students receive excellent training. I also wanted to stay with Mayo Clinic. It's a great place to work. I wasn't interested in going anywhere else.

Best part of your training? The clinical rotations. As a student, I was in on many, many surgeries. There was a wide range of interesting and unique cases. I believe the experience I received during clinicals was superior. It prepared me very thoroughly for the work I do as a certified surgical technologist.

**Your work now?** I started in thoracic and vascular surgery at Mayo Clinic. Then I moved to the Methodist Campus in urology and transplant surgery. Two years ago, I switched to Saint Marys. Since then, I've worked mainly in trauma and critical care. I am in the float pool, so I can work anywhere in the hospital.

What do you enjoy most? Two things: the teamwork and helping patients. Mayo Clinic's value that the needs of the patients come first is true. That's always the goal. And in the OR, we're not working as individuals to make it happen. We always work as a team. That makes a big difference for our patients, and it makes my work enjoyable.



ith the man behind "Phlebotomy Top Gun" now an associate dean for Mayo School of Health Sciences, expect more innovative maneuvers from this advocate for allied health professionals.

Brad Karon, MD, PhD, associate dean for academic affairs since March 2014, has a history with MSHS. As vice chair of education for Mayo Clinic's Department of Laboratory Medicine and Pathology (DLMP) in Rochester, Minnesota, he oversaw seven MSHS programs.

"DLMP has a fairly large footprint within MSHS," Dr. Karon explains. "Over time, I developed more and more interest in allied health education."

A member of the MSHS Education Committee since 2011, Dr. Karon also served as medical director of both the Medical Laboratory Science Program and the Phlebotomy Technician Program.

At the annual Mayo Medical Labs Phlebotomy Conference, Dr. Karon takes center stage for "Phlebotomy Top Gun," where attendees strafe him with questions from their practices, and he fires back with the latest evidence.

"I enjoy sharing my knowledge," says Dr. Karon, the recipient of the MSHS 2013 Outstanding Physician/ Scientist Educator Award. "I get satisfaction from interacting with learners and watching them grow."

#### Eager to teach

Dr. Karon came to Mayo Clinic in 2004 in search of opportunities for teaching and leadership after five years in a community pathology practice at a Las Vegas hospital.

"What I missed most was the ability to interact with students and learners on a daily basis," Dr. Karon says. "When you're interacting with learners on a regular basis, it keeps

things fresh. They force you to look at things from a different perspective."

In his new role, Dr. Karon chairs the MSHS Academic Affairs Committee, which oversees more than 120 training programs and 60 career programs. He also directs progress on MSHS strategic priorities aimed at more efficient delivery of more effective education, including interprofessional education and blended learning.

Interprofessional education brings together students from different programs to learn in multidisciplinary settings. Dr. Karon foresees more joint classes involving multiple MSHS programs plus more classes that combine MSHS students, medical students, residents and fellows.

"We're partnering with Mayo Medical School to explore opportunities for learners to become part of multidisciplinary teams so they can learn the teamwork that is needed to provide the best care possible," Dr. Karon says.

Blended learning supplements traditional classroom activities and hands-on training with online instruction.

"We're advancing in blended learning with more online education within the school," Dr. Karon says. "And we're looking at how to make use of MSHS online content and tools beyond Mayo Clinic's campus in Rochester. There's no reason we can't export quality education outside our walls."



Off-campus rotations (OCR): OCR sites provide students with an understanding of anesthesia practice outside a large academic center. These sites are where students gain needed experience in a smaller/rural anesthesia practice and where they obtain regional anesthesia experience. 

## Retiring from a career that encompassed many opportunities

ethany Krom, administrator, Mayo School of Health Sciences (MSHS), says she's an introvert at heart — but admits hardly anyone believes it.

That's because over her 35 years at Mayo Clinic, she has jumped into new leadership opportunities with aplomb — in research, purchasing and education. She's active away from work, too. Krom has acted in regional theater. Her most recent gig was playing Mother Alfred Moes in Mayo Clinic's Sesquicentennial Signature Event. And, she is a board member for the Eagle Bluff Environmental Learning Center in Lanesboro, Minnesota.

"I've had tremendous opportunities to do very different things," says Krom, who is retiring from Mayo Clinic at the end of 2014.

With an undergraduate degree in chemistry and geology, she started her Mayo career in a research lab at Mayo Clinic Hospital - Rochester, Saint Marys Campus. She transferred to the Arizona campus to help establish the research shield there. When that endeavor was delayed, she shifted into Purchasing — eventually becoming the purchasing supervisor. After seven years in Arizona, she moved back to Rochester. She was named director for procurement at a time when Mayo had more than one million square feet of space under construction.

She was involved in the launch of AskMayoExpert, the start of the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine Office for Diversity, and integration efforts for the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine in the Midwest.

She joined MSHS in 2004, where colleagues say she's left an indelible mark. "Bethany is the first person that comes to mind when I think of an individual most dedicated to Mayo Clinic," says Claire Bender, MD, former dean of MSHS. "Her whole heart is in her work for students, faculty, patients and staff."

MSHS was "loose conglomeration" of programs when she first joined school leadership, says Krom. Working with Dr. Bender, Michael Silber, MB, ChB, current dean, and the leadership team, MSHS has grown into a cohesive school, with more programs, blended learning opportunities and collaborative bachelor's programs with the

Krom says her greatest contributions have been the result of making connections. "I've been able to put people and initiatives together, and good things have happened," she says.

Troy Tynsky, MSHS operations manager who will follow Krom into the role of administrator, agrees. "She inspires the team and expects us to hold one another accountable to the highest standards," he says.

In October 2014, Krom was named a Fellow in the Association of Schools of Allied Health Professions. This recognition acknowledges her contributions to promote excellence in teaching, research, service and leadership in allied health education. "It's a real honor," she says. "Most fellows have been deans."

Krom heads into retirement with a packed agenda. She'll work as an executive coach. She'll spend more time with family, including her three grandchildren. Also she plans to be more involved in community activities in Lanesboro, where her husband, Robin, is mayor.
